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

Residents liaison meeting

What was discussed?

- Updates on construction of GOSH CCC
 - Masterplan, traffic survey
- Residents concerns environmental and health impacts





Lessons from residents

- Proactive approach to consultation
- Important issues overlooked in liaison process
- Better community engagement
- Active communication channels with residents, including better local advertising of events





GOSH Young Peoples Advisory Group (YPAG) meeting:Jan 2020

We learned from children and young people that: things were improving with attention to air quality and sustainability on both individual and community levels They gave us ideas for cleaner travel - sticks and carrots fees/fines or incentivising 'green' travel. Ideas for local air quality including initiatives on smoking around hospitals



Coram's fields under lockdown

"In my local hospital, many outpatient appointments were done digitally, and this could continue"

- Free bikes for NHS workers was a positive from health & environmental perspectives.
- Coram's conversion to a car park was deemed necessary but all were eager for return back to a safe green space.
- YP thought that increased community cohesion (clapping, singing, drumming) & quieter roads to encourage 'greener' travel should be maintained post lockdown.

YPAG Lockdown

Lessons learnt:

"I think singing at GOSH is a fantastic idea once a week"

- Shift in their own and their households' attitudes to cycling / walking as a means of travel –
- Increase in virtual consultations a priority for YP – discussed patient travel burdens, carbon emissions, GOSH's high annual numbers of outpatient visits.

"I personally discovered in lockdown [...] cycling has reduced the time it takes to get to places"

"[...] raised awareness that actually you don't have to drive or take public transport everywhere"





- 50 respondents -survey run by by local resident Rachel (GOSH residents liaison group) and a volunteer Savannah recruited via Ana
- Over 95% local residents, business owners and workers
- 57% in rented housing; most others own occupiers
- Most lived 1-5 mins from the hospital; 88% thought local air quality poor pre Covid
- Top issues cars, building and emissions, cigarette smoke
- Over half prioritized cutting vehicle activity followed by construction regulation, more walking/biking facilities and more low emission public transport
- 17% identified as Asian British //mixed ethnicity

Local citizens survey

"How can we maintain the gains?"

";what else can we do to protect ourselves and our children from lung damage?"

'why are GOSH so unwilling to take the simple and obvious steps open to them to minimise local pollution arising from their major development in Gt Ormond St.'

- Local buy in matters
 Response depended on local contacts and posters.
- Resourceful citizens: One respondent wrote: "We run a campaign group 'Bloomsbury Air' and work with the Air Team, Mums for Lungs and London Car Free day"
- Need to do better with recruiting BAME neighbours

I agree with the construction work at GOSH, despite the problems for residents. But other locals have voiced opposition ... it would be helpful to have more dialogue




Where do data come from?
