




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
What is the Household Support Fund?

In 2021, Household Support Fund (HSF) was introduced as a temporary measure to assist vulnerable people with essential costs, including food. Local authorities have autonomy over how they allocate the funding, some providing vouchers and cash directly to families with children, others supporting third party organisations. Little is known about how HSF is allocated to families in deprived areas, the reasoning and the impact it has.

- Highlight successes, challenges and generate evidence that can be used for future funding strategies, to better support food insecure families with children.



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
